HISTORIC PARK & museum

The Frisco Historic Park & Museum features ten historic buildings and cabins to explore year-round. There are exhibits throughout the buildings covering topics like the mining boom and bust, railroads, Ute peoples, government, ranching, skiing, fashion, daily life, and much more. The centerpiece is the fully restored 1899 Schoolhouse, listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

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HISTORY OF FRISCO

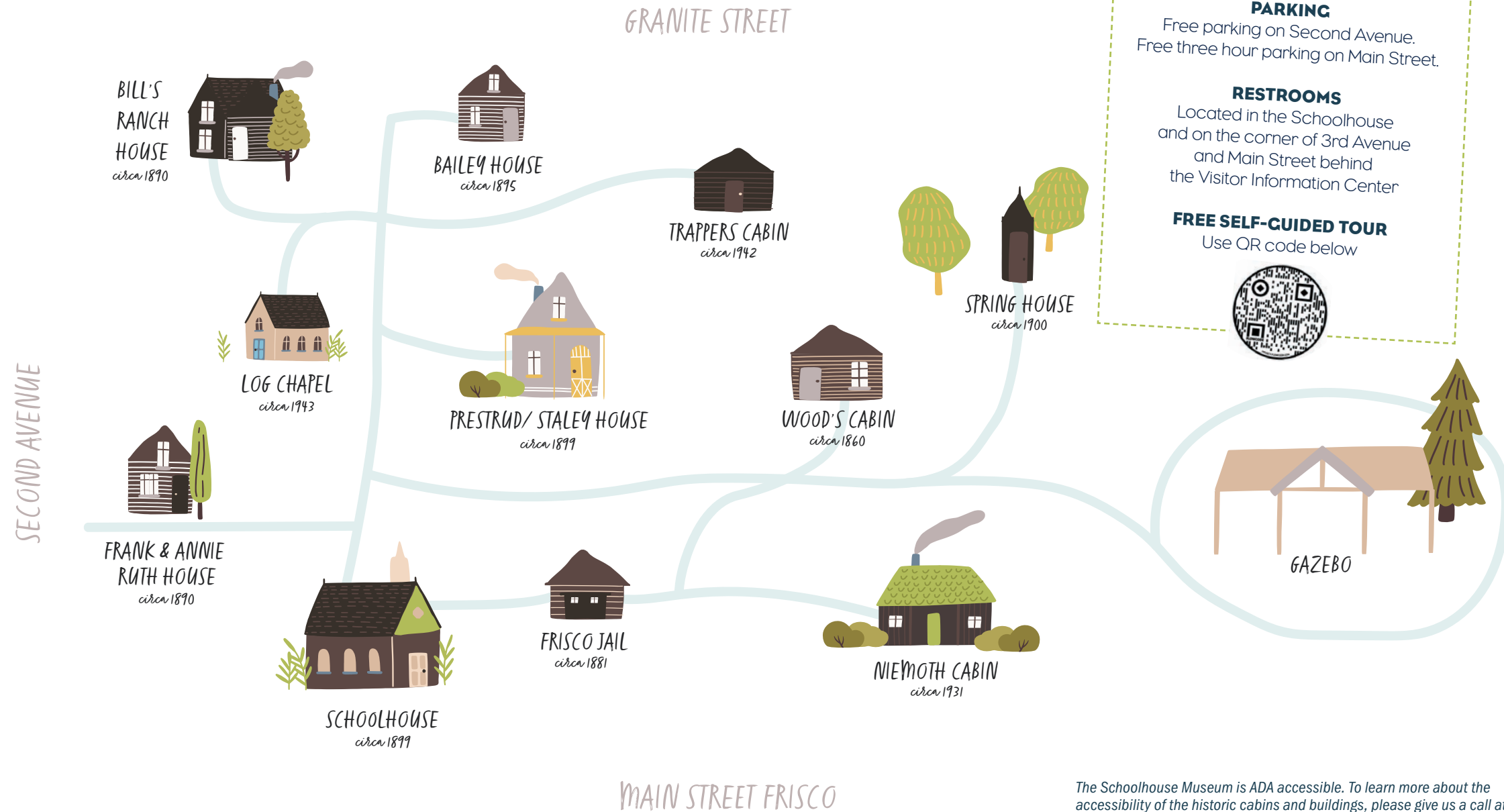
The Town of Frisco voted to incorporate in 1880 with a population of approximately 100 residents in the town limits and many more in the surrounding mining camps. Designed with railroads and miners in mind, Frisco hosted two railroads, several hotels and saloons, businesses, and housing.

Frisco continued to grow and shrink with the silver mining industry but maintained a vibrant, active culture year-round. Ski jumping competitions and winter festivals brought people from around the state. Summer baseball games were wildly popular with each town claiming their team as the best. Social gatherings and parties at the mining towns created connections throughout Summit County.

The Great Depression threatened to shutter the small town with only 18 residents remaining in 1930. That same year the Thomas family created a summer cabin community that attracted people from across the Front Range/ Denver area. Frisco's population continued to grow over the next few decades with the development of the ski resort industry, major infrastructure projects like the Dillon Dam and Eisenhower Tunnel, and the construction of the I-70 highway. The 2020 census listed over 3,116 year-round residents in Frisco with numerous hotels, restaurants, breweries, grocery stores, and plenty of outdoor and indoor activities.
